HOW OUR SMALL SCHOOL WORKS: McMaster Classroom Explanation

In our multi-age classroom, students from Kindergarten to Year 5 learn together in a supportive and inclusive environment. A significant portion of learning is conducted as a whole group, with careful differentiation to ensure that all students are challenged and supported at their individual levels. This structure fosters a strong sense of community, where younger students benefit from the guidance of their older peers, and older students develop leadership and mentoring skills.

Every student is encouraged to showcase their individual strengths throughout the year, whether in academic subjects, creative pursuits, in sport, or leadership opportunities. Lessons are designed to be flexible, allowing students to engage with content in ways that suit their learning styles and abilities. For literacy and numeracy, students are grouped into two learning teams:

- The Joeys (Early Stage 1) Kindergarten students receive targeted instruction suited to their developmental needs.
- The Roos (Stage 1, 2, and 3) Year 1 to Year 5 students work together, with learning tailored to their respective stages.

This structure ensures that all students receive appropriate instruction while still benefiting from collaboration across age groups. The classroom environment promotes independence, cooperation, and a love of learning, making it a unique and enriching experience for all.

NSW PREMIER'S READING CHALLENGE 2025

Since 2002, the NSW Premier's Reading Challenge has been supporting students in NSW to develop a love of reading for leisure and pleasure, and providing encouragement to engage with quality literature.

This year's challenge began 24th February and ends on 22nd August, 2025.

This is not a competition, but offers students the opportunity to read a wide variety of text.

We have been given a comprehensive reading list, available at school.

The requirements are as follows:

Kinder – Year 2 min. 20 from PRC book list plus 10 individual choice (total at least 30 books). These can be read by the student, or be read to them.

Year 3 – Year 5 min. 10 from PRC book list plus 10 individual choice (total at least 20 books). These can be read on their own, or they can have help choosing books.

Certificates of Recognition with the student's name on, will be issued (but not made public) to the students who have completed the challenge.

We are planning fun activities at school to incorporate the challenge, and with Mrs Nairne in the library.

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EXPLORING PATTERNS



Our students have been busy exploring the fascinating world of repeating patterns in Mathematics! This week, we focused on the idea that patterns have a core that repeats over and over and over again. Through hands-on activities, discussions, and movement, students learned to identify, describe, and extend different types of repeating patterns.

Discovering the Core of Patterns

Students explored how a pattern core can be described using letters or symbols, such as AB, ABC, ABB, or ABA. They worked on:

- Identifying the core of a repeating pattern.
- Describing repeating cores using symbols.
- Creating and extending patterns with a core that repeats.
- Using their understanding to create vertical patterns.



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CREATING REPEATING PATTERNS

Students were encouraged to look for patterns in their everyday lives and worked with various materials to create their own. At different learning stations, they experimented with patterns using stickers, coloured animals, and natural items (such as paper daisies, gumnuts, and banksia seed pods), paper clips, buttons, and colouring activities.







COMBINING MATHEMATICS WITH MOVEMENT



In an exciting cross-curricular connection, we combined our CAPA "Moving Me" Unit with Mathematics! Working in pairs, students created patterns using body percussion (clapping, clicking and stomping in a range of repeated sequences).

Students performed a range of actions and dance moves to music, reinforcing their understanding of repeating patterns in a fun and engaging way.

By the end of the lesson, students had a deeper understanding of how patterns work and could confidently describe and extend different types of repeating patterns. It was a fantastic hands-on learning experience that connected mathematics, movement, and creativity!

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
