


Handwriting


THE IMPORTANCE OF HANDWRITING


At Cassilis Public School, we place a strong emphasis on explicit handwriting instruction to support our students' literacy development. Research shows that handwriting plays a crucial role in learning to read, spell, and write. It also enhances overall academic success by stimulating neural pathways linked to letter recognition and composition skills.

Our handwriting lessons focus on three essential components: posture, pencil grasp, and letter formation. Ensuring that students sit correctly, hold their pencils using a tripod grip, and form letters correctly from the start sets them up for success. In Kindergarten, handwriting is closely connected to phonics lessons. As students learn letter sounds, they also practice forming those letters correctly.

In a recent lesson, the Joeys practiced writing on the whiteboard table, while the Roos used whiteboards with dotted thirds to refine their letter formation.











Students have been exploring the concept of living things and where they can be found. Using a Venn diagram, they identified living things that exist on land, in water, or both. A key challenge was to consider whether a freshly picked flower is living or non-living, encouraging critical thinking. To conclude, students revisited the question, What is a living thing?, sharing their ideas and clarifying any misconceptions.

Students also taught Ms Bowen some fascinating new information—she had never heard of a mudskipper, an amphibious fish that can live on both land and water! In a kismet twist of fate, during lunch play, students discovered a brown toadlet in the sandpit—an excellent real-life example of a creature that thrives in both environments. This was eerily similar to the baby redbelly black snake spotted by students on the very same day the topic of living things was introduced in Science!

Cooper has also recently spotted an Eastern Bearded Dragon in the playground. Students gathered at a safe and respectful distance to observe the lizard up close, marvelling at its spiky appearance and camouflage. This realworld encounter deepened their understanding of how living things adapt to their environments.




Exploring What Animals Need to Survive



In Science, students have been investigating the essential needs of animals and how they are met in different environments. They are learning that all animals require air, water, food, and shelter to survive.

We have been exploring the responsibilities of pet owners.
Students read What Does My Dog Need?, sparking conversations about whether all animals have the same needs as pets. They then recorded a list of pets owned by classmates and analysed how their needs compare.

To deepen their understanding, students created profiles for different pets, identifying what they require to stay healthy and happy. As a hands-on extension, they designed their own "class pet shop," using playdough and modelling clay to craft model pets before completing profiles about how to care for them.





















Our range of pets on display was many and varied! We had a few dogs, a cat, a horse, and a bird, as well as a snail, a jellyfish and a turtle! Ella's playdough bird is also displayed impressively in her Pet Profile.
